Woodturning is a craft - an art form for many people - where wood is cut and shaped (turned) on a lathe with a variety of hand-held tools. The various tools are used to cut the wood in different ways. What makes woodturning so interesting is that a single piece of wood can be turned into a vase, a lidded jar, a bowl, a plate, a pen, a bottle stopper, or a beautiful art piece. It all depends on the vision and imagination of the woodturner (maker). How the wood becomes something beautiful and/or useful depends on the tools used - and the skill of the maker. Woodturners continually aspire to hone and advance their craft. Incremental improvements over time produce amazing works of art.

A day with BOY SCOUTS TROOP 322 and VENTURE CREW 17

An Introduction to Woodturning:

On Saturday, August 2, 2025, Boy Scouts Troop 322 and Venture Crew 17 had the unique opportunity to dive into the world of woodturning, thanks to a one-day session sponsored by the HCW. Held at Brian Schrader's shop, the event was designed to introduce the Scouts to the basics of woodturning.

A Day Packed with Learning and Fun

The day began bright and early at 8:00 am with introductions and an overview of the day's activities by Dan Parsons (Troop Leader/HCW Member), Joe Grimes, and Brian Schrader. Safety was a top priority, and Joe Grimes, the lead instructor, ensured that all participants were wellversed in the necessary precautions before diving into the hands-on activities. The Scouts were introduced to the major components of lathes and the primary woodturning tools.

Hands-On Projects

The first project of the day was turning whistles. Each Scout aimed to complete two whistles: one to donate to Operation Christmas Child and one to keep. The first blank was pre-drilled, while the second required the participants to complete all operations themselves. Bill Belitz explained the basic steps of whistle making, then the group broke out for individual work. During a well-deserved lunch (paid for by the Scouts; thank you!), the group watched a YouTube video by George Freeman on wood processing. The afternoon session resumed with a focus on lathe tool sharpening with Brian Schrader explaining the tools and techniques involved. Through the afternoon each Scout had the chance to rotate through the sharpening station to

set up and sharpen two tools, addressing a merit badge requirement. The Scouts then moved on to their second project: turning pens. Howard Wellspring demonstrated the equipment and steps, and the Scouts selected their kits and wood, performed the lathe setups, turned the pens, and applied a simple wax finish. Howard provided cast pen blanks with embedded scouting emblems for those who wanted to use them. Several made a second pen. For the final project, Joe showed how to turn a small bowl, starting with a 2"x 6"x 6" pre-prepared pine blank. With limited time, the day ended with the bowls in various stages of completion, though time was adequate for the scouts to practice and appreciate the use of bowl gouges.

Objectives and Achievements

The primary objectives for the Scouts were:
1) to learn the basic elements of
woodturning, 2) to accomplish approximately six elements required for the
Woodworking merit badge, 3) and to participate in a new, fulfilling, and fun activity.
For HCW, the event served as a community outreach and the opportunity to help build tomorrow's leaders.

A Successful Event

The woodturning session was a resounding success, providing the Scouts and Venture Crew with valuable hands-on experience and a deeper appreciation for the craft. The collaboration between Boy Scouts Troup 322, Venture Crew 17, and the Hunt County Woodturners highlighted the importance of community involvement and skill development.





HCW COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES!

HCW is starting to get more involved in our community. Here is a list of the programs we're helping and a very brief description of what they do. Please look at each program on our website under the "Community" banner for more information and full details of how to get involved with each one.

EMPTY BOWLS: Organized by the North Texas Food Bank, is an annual event that raises funds to support North Texans facing hunger. The funds raised from the event provide critical support to the NTFB's programs. Bowl contributions may be delivered to *Alain Schwarz*.

<u>VETERANS PENS</u>: Is a diversion program for Justice-Involved Veterans (JIV) who are facing prosecution for one or more criminal cases. Their mission is to provide support and rehabilitation to qualified JIV criminal defendants whose crimes were materially connected to injuries suffered as a result of honorable service in the United States Armed Forces. Completed pens can be given to <u>Lee Craft or Chris Cohen</u>.

FREEDOM PEN: This program started in 2004 by the Sgt Joe Kelly Freedom Pen Foundation as an all-volunteer initiative to provide custom hand-crafted pens to American servicemen and women. It is for anyone interested in donating their time, talent, and services in providing writing instruments for active-duty military personnel, as well as veterans, as a symbol of our support and care. Pens can be delivered to *Lee Craft*.

RESTORED HOPE: This program is dedicated to rescuing young women and their children trapped in sexual slavery, trafficking, and domestic violence. Wood-turned items that are donated from across the region typically bring from \$80 to \$500 each to Restored Hope. Items may be given to *Alain Schwarz*.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD: Is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. It collects and distributes shoeboxes filled with gifts to children in need around the world. The shoeboxes typically contain toys, school supplies, hygiene items, and other small gifts. It's part of a broader effort to share the gospel and to support communities in crisis. Toys may be delivered to *Ron Williams*.

BEADS OF COURAGE: This program supports children and teens with serious illnesses by helping them tell their stories of bravery through colorful beads. Each bead represents a significant moment in their treatment journey, such as a medical procedure or personal achievement. Boxes may be delivered to Burt Andrew.

HUNT COUNTY FAIR: is an annual event held in Greenville, Texas, focused on the youth, agricultural, educational, economic, cultural, and institutional strengths of the area. HCW supports our community through our participation in the Fair, while offering us the opportunity to show the public what we do. Our demonstrations are popular with fairgoers as we demonstrate the art of woodturning. Our booth is located in front of the Creative Arts building. Finished wood-turned items will be displayed in the booth and within the building.
