





SWAT2024 is coming AUGUST 23, 24, 25

Lee Craft, our own HCW SWAT Director, has news from this year's first meeting with the SWAT Board of Directors. Registration will open <u>March 4th</u>. The date is set for the weekend of August 23-25th. Set up will be on Thursday the 22nd and any club members who want to go a day early and help set up just need talk with Lee. The



early registration cost for the weekend will be \$190 for the 3-day ticket package. The Saturday night dinner will be \$30. Those that have gone in previous years might notice this slight increase in cost. SWAT, just like HCW, is a non-profit organization, and so even though their goal is not to make money, neither is it to lose money. For the last two years, SWAT has had a deficit, mainly due to the cost of catering meals and refreshments. There are seven other woodturning symposiums, similar to SWAT, across the country each year. All of the other seven have a higher cost than SWAT and most do not serve meals to the attendees, so even with a \$25 increase for the weekend and a \$5 increase for the Saturday dinner, this is still a great deal! SWAT is held in Waco at the Convention Center, 100 Washington Ave.

<u>Demonstrators</u>: The lead demonstrators will be: Beth Irland, Sammy Long, Jason Breech, Kurt Hirtzon, Stewart Batty, Laurant Nicolot, and Kirk DeHeer. We encourage you to search YouTube for their videos.

There will be Ornamental Turners represented this year (Rose Engine Lathe)

<u>Raffle</u>: The 3-for-1 Raffle this year will offer an American Beauty lathe as the grand prize as well as three Jet 12-21's along with other good prizes.

<u>Hotels:</u> SWAT has coordinated special rates of \$170/night for a block of rooms at two hotels adjacent to the convention center: Hilton and Courtyard by Marriott. Breakfast is included at both of these hotels. Registration at these hotels will also open on March 4th.

Woodturners continually aspire to hone and advance their craft. Incremental improvements over time produce amazing works of art.
