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

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### A WORD ON OPEN SHOPS

The September Open Shop at Brian Livingston's and Dale King's shop was very well attended. As always, Open Shop is a come-n-go. We had some early departures and some late arrivals. I counted at least 30 people passed through! I believe that is the first 30+ number we have had this year.

The mini-class was "Band Saw Tune Up". Tim White was under the weather that day, so your Training Coordinator, ESQ., was scrambling to find a last-minute substitute. After vetting extensive credentials, I asked George Freeman and Howie Stevens to fill in. Everyone knows George and his extensive resume and experience. I could fill pages listing his talents, but I will suffice to offer a humble *Thank You* to George. I have heard Mickey Mouse has a George Freeman watch.

I was pleased to find one of HCW newest members, Howie Stevens, was willing to help with the class. I refer to Howie as "The Centurion" as he is the 100<sup>th</sup> registered member of HCW. Howie has taken several classes from Alex Snodgrass. Alex is a virtuoso in the art of all things bandsaw. Conduct an internet search on "Alex Snodgrass Bandsaw" and you will find hours of YouTube links on subjects of set-up, tune-up and mastering your bandsaw. Howie brought some sample 3D cutting boards he produced after taking some of the Snodgrass classes. Howie is a fairly new turner and is signed up for the **Beginner's Turning class which is this weekend!** A very special thanks to Howie for although new to HCW and not an experienced turner was willing to share his knowledge and experience. This willingness to share is a characteristic I have admired about the brotherhood (and sisterhood) of woodturning.

There are 2 more Open Shop mini-classes to close out the 2024 year. One will be "Crack Filling Techniques". What is your 'go-to' method to fill cracks and voids? There are many techniques and we will cover just a few. The other mini-class will be focused on the Niles Joyner Off Center Jig. The Jim Duxbury – "DUX Chuck" is a variant on this theme. These offset chucks are great for off axis necklace pendants, trivets, multi-axis bottle stopers, etc. As a sidebar at the Open Shop, Burt Andrew was offering instruction on "Turning Handles". Do you know how heavy the midi-lathes are, and the logistics required to get four lathes set up at every Open Shop? It is a shame these lathes go unused anytime they are transported and set up for hands-on events. Did I mention Woodturning is a brotherhood? That camaraderie and friendship encourages members to visit, eat Donuts and tell "Fish Stories". This spirit of sharing and members being too humble to jump on a lathe, leaves vacancies at the workstations. To remedy that lack of use, I suspect George and Burt colluded in an unsanctioned quorum and developed a plan. Together they offered quality blanks FREE, "IE" a handle was turned at Open Shop. FISH ON! I think every lathe in the shop was occupied. Not only did we have more people in the Open Shop than usual, but the group also generated more 'Man Glitter' (no offense to our lady turners), than Dale & our Prez combined can produce in a solid week of turning.

Look for future opportunities to encourage using the lathes at Open Shop. Of course, these opportunities will mean you need to arrive before both the Donuts and available lathes are gone.

Thank you Stacy Nehl for sharing your talent and teaching this amazing wood-art. Everyone enjoyed the class and should be proud of their finished piece. One of the great things about HCW is the versatility of skills within the club.

### Johnny Hayre

When asked to write about myself, my first thought was "I'm pretty dang boring". So here's my life. Read or skip this – your choice.

What was my profession? I typed for a living. Started at TI. At my 8 years at TI, I wrote software that helped make semiconductors. Left there to work for 7 years at a startup that never started up, then went to E-Systems/Raytheon/L3 for 22 more years. All jobs were writing software and remarkably I was never out of a job. Am I married? Yes. For 51 years. Five years of hell followed by better than and now better still. We got to know each other eventually and even learned to get along. Kids / Grandkids? Had 5, two are no longer living. Still have three, a girl and two boys. They have given me 7 grandchildren: 3 girls and 4 boys. And anyone with a fair evaluation will admit that mine are more adorable, smarter, and pleasant than any others in the lower 48 and possibly the entire North American Continent. Have you traveled? Some, almost nowhere. Canada: 6 hours, England: 2 hours, Germany: 3 weeks, Salzburg, Austria: 9 hours, Mexico: 16 days. Urey Colorado: several 1-week vacations. Grand Canyon: 5 hours. (If you think like I once did "It's just a big crack in the ground," it's not. You have to physically stand beside it to appreciate its magnificence. When I realized the string of 'ants' I could barely see on the other side was actually a line of 18-wheelers I began to appreciate the size of the dang thing.) How long have I been woodturning and what do I like most about the club? I have been turning since 1995 and I have two favorite things about the club. The number one thing is the people. I'm amazed at the talent and friendliness. The second thing is the meetings in which I like most to see what others have made and show off my turnings. One of my design goals, when turning, is to elicit my favorite question. Namely, "How did you do that?" (Even though the correct answer is usually "Saw a YouTube video.") Of course we can all get "How did you do that?" from the laity, but it is especially cool to hear that question from a fellow turner. What is something you'd like to share about yourself, maybe something no one knows? I have a condition in which I cannot understand words very well. That made it challenging to learn to talk. When I repeat a word, even immediately after hearing it, it doesn't come out much like what was said. This made me extremely quiet and shy when I was young. Through the years I've become adept at guessing the meaning of what I hear. As you might guess, this condition makes spelling almost impossible. A dictionary is of no use when you have three or more candidates for the first letter. Listening to lectures was very hard unless they were accompanied with text displays. For the first few years in school to "help me," the school hired a speech therapist to whom I was sent for an hour each day. What a waste of time. When I repeated a word I couldn't hear any difference between the word I was mispronouncing and the word that I was asked to repeat. Because of my condition in second grade, I often didn't understand the teacher's instructions. I'd ask Jimmy, the boy who sat beside me, what the teacher wanted. When he explained that, I generally knew how to do it, so Jimmy would copy my paper. We got along fine. My college English teacher was appalled that I could get through high school misspelling so many words. It didn't stop there either. At E-Systems, my colleagues had me in derision laughing at my emails.

Despite my condition, I was asked to write a weekly article for the Greenville Banner newspaper entitled "Tales From Texas" in which the editor told me to write anything I wanted. The Banner even paid me! I raked in 20 bucks an article and occasionally I was able to write in less than 6 hours. In writing this biography, I used SpellCheck and also ChatGPT and that's when I had an inspiration and gave ChatGPT my symptoms and asked for the medical term for my condition. The reply goes as follows: "...what you're describing is a condition called "auditory processing disorder" (APD). APD affects how the brain processes and interprets sounds, including speech. People with APD might have trouble distinguishing subtle differences in sounds, which can impact their ability to understand and spell words correctly."



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
