But knowing the kind of man Mike is, I really don't see that happening. Hunt County Woodturners is a great club, and those of us on the Board are constantly trying to make it better for everyone. So, I'm asking, If you are able, and have the time to volunteer to help this club operate and remain a great club, Myself and the rest of the Board would really appreciate it. 
Here's your chance to learn the basics as you work through a variety of projects. The class will be limited to 10 members, so jump in to reserve your place.

SWAT News

As SWAT Director, I went to Waco last Saturday for the first SWAT board meeting of the year.

Due mainly to low attendance last year, SWAT lost \$32,500. As you might guess, they cannot stand many more years like that. They're catering cost alone was over \$70,000. If you have eaten in the past months, you know how much food prices have risen. They're proposed catering cost for this year is over \$93,000. Therefore, for the first time since 2013, they are raising ticket prices. Early Registration (on line) ticket prices are going to be \$175.00. That's up from the \$140. we've been paying. Spouses will cost \$100. Banquet tickets are the same \$45.00. This is for all 3 days. a one day ticket is \$100.00. Walk up tickets (not on line) are going to be \$275.00 for 3 days, \$150.00 for one day. Early on line registration is strongly encouraged, you may have noticed it's a hundred dollars cheaper than walk up, not only for your tickets, but T shirts and handbooks. This way they will have a accurate number of how many will attend so they will know how much food is needed, how many shirts, and how many handbooks to have printed. This will help they're bottom line a great deal , which is \$218,393.00. That is what it cost to put on a good SWAT symposium. There will be no Friday night show or meal.

The lead demonstrators this year are Martin Sabin Smith, Mike Mahoney Andy Wolfe, Barry Gross, Dennis Paullis, Craig Timmerman, and Trent Bosh. The 3 for 1 Raffle features a grand prize of a Robust American Beauty Lathe, along with 3 other prizes of Laguna REVO 12/16 lathes. Artist donations for the raffle will be appreciated. As always, the host hotels are the Hilton and the Courtyard who are giving us the discounted SWAT rate of \$160 per night.

Early Registration begins March 15th, SWAT dates are Aug 26, 27, and 28.

	Silicone Molds are available for resin projects and are used often by those who wish to make their own pen blanks.
	Silicone Glue Brushes are handy for ap- plying wood glue to a project. After use, you can let the brush dry, and the crusty glue will just peel off for an easy cleanup.
	Silicone Mats are also super handy for easy project cleanup.
	However, don't get super glue on the edge of a silicone mat. If it sticks to you work bench and you pull on the silicone mat it will tear!



Aromatic Red Cedar

Facts on Aromatic Red Cedar

from <u>Aromatic Red Cedar | The Wood Database - Lumber Identification (Softwood) (wood-database.com</u>)

- Janka Hardness: 900 lbf
- Overall, Aromatic Red Cedar is easy to work, notwithstanding any knots or irregularities present in the wood. It reportedly has a high silica content, which can dull cutters. Aromatic Red Cedar glues and finishes well, though in many applications, the wood is left unfinished to preserve its aromatic properties.
- Resin canals absent; earlywood to latewood transition gradual, grain moderately uneven to moderately even; tracheid diameter small to very small; zonate parenchyma (double ring).
- Has a straight grain, usually with knots present. Has a very fine even texture.
- Regarded as excellent in resistance to both decay and insect attack, Aromatic Red Cedar is frequently used for fence posts used in direct ground contact with no pre-treating of the wood.

If this wood seems interesting please take the opportunity to try Aromatic Red Cedar, you may like it!

Hunt County Woodturners Board Meeting Minutes February 3, 2022

This meeting was conducted through Zoom only.

Club members Attending: Lee Craft*, Gary Sanders*, Joe Grimes*, Burt Andrew*, Doug Balzer*, Alan Fields*, Dale Scruggs, George Freeman, Steve Thomason, Kevin Young, Cynthia Balzer. [Elected board members for 2022 indicated *. A quorum of board members was in attendance.] [Board member Mike Ragsdale could not attend due to power outages at home.]

The Meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by HCW President, Lee Craft.

Items of Business

President – Lee Craft

Lee noted that he has a meeting planned with Carl Gideon to discuss and understand website issues. Informed that the first SWAT meeting of the year was held in Waco last Saturday, January 29, and that significant changes have been adopted for this year's SWAT. (details below under SWAT Director)

Treasurer – Alan Fields

January bank statement highlights were presented to the board during the meeting. A printed version was made available to board members in advance of the meeting.

Significant income and expense items:

Income: Paypal dues, raffle tickets

Expense: Storage building rental prepayment through 2/1/23

Checking account balance:

January 1, 2022: \$11,509.

January 31, 2022: \$9,337.

Discussed disposition of CD#3 (\$5,163.) maturing 3/12/22, relative to continuing CD vs money market, same bank.

Gary Sanders made a motion to reinvest the maturing CD into a money market account. The motion was seconded by Joe Grimes. Motion passed.

Alan called Carl Gideon to discuss and validate the \$300. invoice from Brenda Short for past domain name charges. Carl will confirm with Brenda, then will notify Alan so that the invoice can be resolved and paid.

Alan informed that he would file Form 990 (Organization Exemption Form for Income Tax). It wasn't filed in 2021, though we're still safely within the three-year window for filing.

Secretary – Burt Andrew

Approval of minutes from January 6, 2022, board meeting:

Gary Sanders made a motion to accept the minutes from the January 6, 2022, board meeting, with no changes. The motion was seconded by Doug Balzer. Motion passed.

Membership currently stands at 101. We increased by 4 new members last meeting.

Nova lathe loaner agreement:


Lathe is currently in possession of Eaton family with initial term 12/8/2021 through 3/8/2022.

The loan agreement offers the option to extend the loan period for one additional three-month term at the User's written request.

Brian Livingston has expressed interest in borrowing the lathe next.

Discussed process for queuing up next users. Will loan to next requesting member unless several members are interested at the same time. If several members are interested, the Board will make a selection after discussion.

Vice President – Gary Sanders:

Janice Levi pyrography class in May:

We have, so far, 7 interested members (enough for one class). George asked to be added to the list, bringing the number to 8.

Per student charge from demonstrator will be \$100, though Gary stated that charge may be negotiated down to \$90.

Gary suggested that the per-student tuition be set to \$100.

The Club meeting demo cost will be \$250.

The pyrography class will be held on Friday, February 11, at Lee's shop.

Equipment/supplies order:

Woodturner Wonders: Can be anything from the Woodturner Wonders website. Members to pay listed price; Woodturner Wonders will issue gift cards to benefit the Club. If interested, give clear description of item(s) from website, or (preferred) print item/page of interest, along with payment, to treasurer Alan Fields. End date for submissions, end of February meeting.
Woodworm: Price \$21. Each. Gary already has 19 names.

Alan will bring a listing of all orders to the February meeting for any adds or changes. All orders will require payment up-front.

Next quarterly challenge (due March meeting) will feature any turned object(s) made from an 8' 2X4, any type of wood.

Briefed plans for Beginner School:

Hunt County Fair:

Confirmed on space, no fees, 20 X 15 tent space, will request same location as before.

Doug will bring member sign-up sheet to February meeting to cover hours: Weekdays, 5pm to 10pm; Weekends, noon to 10pm.

Alan will post this information to the website.

February Open Shop setup will be done early Saturday morning, February 12.

Joe stated that website sign-up pages would be improved if individuals already signed up could be shown. Alan stated that Sign-up Genius will do this, and will plan to utilize it for upcoming sign-up events (i.e. Beginner School, Hunt County Fair, Pyrography class). He will need to be informed regarding event dates, time slots needed, and number of people needed per slot.

SWAT Director – Lee Craft

Last year's SWAT event lost \$32,500 due to low attendance (registrations, apparel, handbooks, wasted food, etc.)

The SWAT Board made significant changes for this year's event to avoid repeat losses:

On-line event registration will be increased from \$140. to \$175. (for all three days). Spouse, additional \$100.

One-day registration, \$100.

On-site (walk-up) registration will be \$275. On-line registration is strongly encouraged, to include any optional additional purchases (t-shirts, handbooks, etc.)

Vendor space will be increased from \$250 to \$350 for 1st space and \$300 for each additional.

Lead demonstrators: Martin Sabin Smith, Mike Mahoney, Andy Wolfe, Barry Gross, Dennis Pauley, Craig Timmerman, Trent Bosch.

Need 14 regional demonstrators, have 11, need 3 more.

3-for-1 Raffle will feature Robust American Beauty lathe, and several Laguna Revo 12/16 lathes.

Artist donations would be accepted and appreciated for the raffle.
